#### Updates from the May 7, 2024 meeting:

At its May 7 meeting Pastor Grube reported the joint Easter services with Prince of Peace Episcopal Church were well received; he and the Prince of Peace clergy discussed sharing quarterly healing services and holding joint Holy Week services again next year. The Mission District Assembly meeting, held at St. Paul's on April 27, went well although only 12 representatives attended, reflecting the fact that there are fewer congregations in our district and several of them share a pastor. About 56 people attended the monthly congregational dinners held during 2023-24; the last dinner was held in April.

**Worship and Music committee:** The committee will look into the possibility of holding an outdoor worship at Frances Slocum State Park sometime this summer (if a pavilion is available).

**Evangelism Committee:** A class for instruction in using the church's AED machine, as well as CPR training, will be held on Wednesday, May 29 at 7:00 p.m. This class is for St. Paul's members only; all those interested in taking the class should contact Gail Ide. The class is free but there will be a \$10 fee for the CPR certification card.

**Long Range Planning Committee:** The committee discussed the attendance of the recent Back Mountain Railroad Club lecture and will consider the possibility of offering other lectures for the public at St. Paul's.

**Finance/Property Committee:** Some recent expenses were discussed such as a \$195 repair to the kitchen oven, repair to the bell at \$450, replacement of broken classroom window at \$635, and installation of three security cameras with monitor and DVD recorder, \$4,592. Projected projects include repair to the flat roof area over Narthex and part of Sanctuary, Social Hall and Administration area at a cost upwards of \$75,000, and the Predella handrail at a cost still to be determined; payment for these projects need to be covered by donations from the Building Improvement envelopes. Our insurance policies are being rewritten through Erie Insurance (Worker's Compensation, Property & Liability, and Umbrella) with a premium savings of \$2,200. The committee is continuing to work on the building and installation of a handrail on the predella.

**Council** gave approval to Head Start for use of a spare classroom from May 28-June 16 for 16 children and staff. Approval was also given to a Lake Lehman High School student to hold a three-day Summer Day Camp in July for her senior graduation project.

#### 100th ANNIVERSARY "FUN FACT"

In the early spring of 1925, 29 charter members met for their first church service in the old Shavertown School Building. They were: Albert Bush, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Christiansen, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dressel, Emeret Dressel Franklin, Mae Hontz Ash, Mr. and Mrs. John Eck, Frederick and Dorothy Eck, Mrs. Delbert Garinger, Mr. and Mrs. William Hoffman, Mrs. Fred Krommelbein and Mildren Krommelbein, Justav A. Kuehn, Mrs. K.G. Laycock, Mrs. Christine Malkemes, Raymond and Fred Malkemes, Mrs. Anna Pealer, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Rau and Elizabeth, Mr. and Mrs. R.J. W. Templin, and Charles Zinn. On May 10, 1925, they adopted a constitution and elected a Church Council. There was no building, but there was a church. A wiry, muscular carpenter named John Eck suggested it be called St. Paul's. For a year, Rev. Bertolet sometimes came out to the Back Mountain to perform the service; other times R.J.W. Templin did. From the first, St. Paul's was a church of doers, of people who worked hard for what they wanted and who cared deeply about what they did!

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#### **MISSION DISTRICT NEWS**

Our thanks to Ray Manck who served as our voting member to the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Mission District Assembly held here at St. Paul's at the end of April.

It began with a festival Holy Communion service at which Pastor Grube presided and Pastor Jira Albers, Dean, preached and led the music, including his own setting of the Holy Communion liturgy. A presentation on the ELCA World Hunger appeal followed, led by Pastor Eileen Smith LeVan, the synod coordinator of World Hunger, in celebration of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the appeal. St. Paul's provided a delicious lunch and the assembly convened for its business meeting. A greatly reduced budget of \$1735 was adopted and elections for various positions included the Mission District's representative to the Synod Council (Jim Doxsey), Dean of the Mission District (Pastor Michele Kaufman), a clergy representative to the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Phoenix (Deacon Dawn Tally), and representatives of the Mission District Council (Pastor Jira Albers & Peggy Cranmer). Ray's own report is included here:

"I recently had the opportunity to attend the annual assembly of the WB-Scranton Mission District as the male delegate for St. Paul's. Following the morning worship service, a very informative presentation about the ELCA's World Hunger Appeal was given by Pastor Eileen and Brian Smith LeVan. The appeal wants to make us all aware that the hunger problem is not just something that is occurring on the other side of the world, but right here in the United States as well, where 44 million people suffer from food insecurity (of which 13 million are children). Fifty percent of all Americans will experience a level of poverty before age 65, and five million seniors have food insecurity. Insufficient food is not the problem; it's the lack of access to the food that is available.

"Pastors Janell Wigen and Michele Kaufman celebrated 35 years of ordination, while Pastor Kurt Garbe marked his 40<sup>th</sup> year of ordination. The attendees discussed the upcoming Global Mission Trip to Saxony in Spring, 2025 and the Global Mission Trip with Saskatchewan, Canada Synod to Uruguay/Argentina Companion Synod. The group also heard about an idea to make first aid kits for the July, 2024 Youth Gathering in New Orleans."

ELCA Global Mission and LIRS (Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) have long been on the forefront (since 1939) of guiding, supporting, and providing relief for immigrants and refugees. At the 2016 Churchwide Assembly the ELCA adopted the AMMPARO strategy. AMMPARO is an acronym that stands for Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities, and cleverly takes its name from the Spanish version of Psalm 46:1. "Dios es nuestro <u>amparo</u> y fortaleza" ("God is our <u>refuge</u> and strength").

The AMMPARO network grew to include partners, from Chile to the United States, that can provide respite and resources for people forced to leave their homes.

Yet the number of people displaced globally continues to grow due to conflict, economic shocks, natural disasters and more — and all these hardships have been compounded by COVID-19.

In response AMMPARO is expanding to reach more people on the move around the world. The AMMPARO network now includes partners in countries such as:

- Zimbabwe: The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zimbabwe's Symbols of Hope program is raising awareness about human trafficking and creating job opportunities at home. About 13,000 program participants are learning skills in masonry, sewing, soap-making and more.
- Serbia: The Ecumenical Humanitarian Organization provides shelter and resources for individuals and families fleeing countries such as Afghanistan and Syria. Ali, a refugee from Syria, says, "I will never forget who helped me to ease the trauma and harsh life of a migrant and dress the wounds inside caused by separation from my family."

In addition to the expansion of the scope of the AMMPARO strategy, ELCA Global Mission recently welcomed new missionaries: Steffen Riley, serving in Kumamoto, Japan, as an ESL teacher with the Japan-3 (J3) program, and Hannah Kurtz, serving in Cambodia as a country coordinator for Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM). Also the Rev. Kristin Engstrom began in her new roles as country representative and as YAGM country coordinator in Madagascar.

Thank you for your support of ELCA Global Mission and the important work they do around the world.
